An Unexpected Gift

Dear Elgin-Portland Family,

Have you ever received a gift that you never forgot about? I have... When I was about nine or ten years old, around Christmas 1976 or 1977, in Beirut, my parents bought me a small electric piano, so that it can help me start taking piano lessons. They could not afford the full-size piano, and of course there was no place in a one-bedroom apartment where nine individuals lived – Yes, we were a family of nine in a one-bedroom and one-bathroom apartment.

I loved music and I still do, and wanted to learn how to play the piano. Even though the dream of pursuing piano lessons could not flourish for more than six months, because of snipers on the way to the closest conservatory, this gift has been an unforgettable gift, because I knew my parents somehow created abundance out of the scarcity of our lives. This unexpected gift not only gave me hope for a better future, but it also taught me that hard times cannot hold us down.

Today, I am reminded of this gift in time, because I believe that Advent is an intentional time for us to think of God's Future offered to the world. An alternative future that ONLY God can offer.

This year, Elgin-Portland Pastoral Charge's Advent Focus is: *Advent: The True Gift that draws us into God's Future...*

This year, when you hear about HOPE, on the very First Sunday of Advent, remember that HOPE is the password for God's Future. On the Second Sunday of Advent when you hear about PEACE remember that God's PEACE surpasses all understanding. On the Third Sunday, when you hear about JOY know that God's PEACE is the foundation of ALL JOY. Some Food for Thought!

Imagine a Bank that credits your account each morning with \$86,400. It carries no balance from day to day. Every evening it deletes whatever part of the balance you failed to use during the day. What would you do? Draw out every cent!!! Each of us has such a bank. It is called Time. Every morning we start off with 86,400 seconds; every night the balance is depleted, written off, we have lost forever whatever we failed to invest to good purpose. Each day has a new, full balance; each night it is all gone. If you fail to use the day's deposits, the loss is yours, there is no going back, there is no drawing against tomorrow. You must live in the present, on today's deposits. Invest it so as to get from it the utmost in health, happiness, and success. Remember, time waits for no one. Yesterday is history. Tomorrow is a mystery. Today is a gift......that is why it is called the present!

New Furnace Fundraising for Portland United

As many of you know the church's largest single expense line after our Pastoral Charge is Energy at about \$12,000/year of which about \$10,000 is for climate control.

For the last few months, the property group under D. Bond has been looking at this cost with the aim of reducing it. They have looked at extra insulation, solar to replace the energy for lighting and oil and propane as alternates for climate control.

The Cost benefit of alternate forms of heating so outweighs the other projects it rose to the top of the project list.

Most of you are aware that a short number of years ago we converted the old electric furnace to a newer and more efficient model and added the heat pump. The heat pump in particular has been very efficient especially for cooling the sanctuary during the summer and heating the building during the spring and fall when the temperature is cool, not cold. Unfortunately when the temperature becomes cold the heat pump becomes less effective and we revert to an electric furnace. We all know what has happened to our electric bills over the last few years.

In fact over the past 6 years if we had been heating with propane rather than electric it is estimated we would have saved over \$20,000 and run in the black for 3 of the 6 years instead of in the red for all 6 years. The three parts of the project explored were, convert the electric furnace to propane, move the heat pump to the back of the building where it is cooler, and add a supplemental heat to the kitchen area.

On Tuesday night Council approved a conversion of our electric furnace to propane, and to maintain the electric heat pump because it will now be primarily a cooling device but, to move it to the back of the building. The cost for this will be about \$9,000 and it can be completed before the New Year.

To do this conversion we need the congregation's financial support relatively quickly as we would like to have our finances in place to make the conversion prior to the cold weather arriving.

If one person bears the cost it is a \$9,000 donation; however, if each of us makes a special donation of \$150 in the next 3 weeks the project is covered. Please review your position and help the church carry on missions of caring rather than of heating.



God's Mission all Around Us!

Portland United Church is a small but vibrant community of faith situated about half way between Kingston and Ottawa.

The congregation numbers between 50 and 100 depending on the time of year and the activities which are being supported. It meets in a 125 yr old, well maintained structure or, for those who are unable to get out, on You Tube, as each service is broadcast.

If the saying "activity breeds activity "is true then the people of Portland United Church are truly blessed

Yes they do support Mission and Service with money totaling over \$12,000 per yr. In this past year their international support rose to over \$20,000 as demand to help refugees find a new home came in as well as other requests.

Yes, in the past year, they supported local charities such as DIG, Food bank and sending children to Camp with cash of over \$12,000. This year they have increased their local support with a fresh mission to help the youth of the community by donating \$3,000 to the libraries and schools of the area.

But they also spend time, not only supporting the above efforts but, developing a strong community of faith. To do this they believe you must support the community not only with money but also with time.

Would you believe that such a small congregation regularly has 15 members of the choir on Sunday? They also have 9 members of the Bell Choir known as the Peelers. Without exaggerating these groups spend over 1600 volunteer hrs preparing each year to help create and support this dynamic community.

Each service is supported by volunteers who decorate, provide technical support, read lessons and Mission and Service information bulletins, greet all comers, provide youth leadership and prepare coffee and count the givings. During special services such as communion additional volunteers step forward or are conscripted to perform the necessary duties

The volunteers are not limited to the adults of the congregation as the youth often take on the above duties and occasionally lead the services. The youth and their leadership are also part of the outreach efforts of the church and during a recent multi week Blast Off series of lessons the youth group attracted young people from the broader community to join in the fun and learning.

As with all communities there are good and bad times but the vibrant Sharing and Caring group consisting of 14 individuals try to visit with all members of the congregation at least twice a year . They use this opportunity to visit, identify looming issues with members, and to distribute the Newsletter, also produced and contributed to by volunteers.

Volunteers also send friendship cards when individuals are ill or in need of a friendly note.

In the event of a death not only are full services provided as one would expect, including a cemetery, yes run by volunteers, but in addition volunteers also acknowledge monetary donations to the memorial fund with a hand written thank-you card.

The community is supported by a full council which meets 6 times a year to help guide and formalize the direction the congregation is taking.

The trustees meet to ensure the assets of the congregation are protected and utilized in a judicious fashion.

The efforts of this community of faith are not all focused on themselves but are also active in helping to improve the quality of life in Rideau Lakes Township.

Each month a community lunch is put on. The volunteers who co ordinate, prepare and serve this luncheon take great pride in the fact that not only do they provide an essential service but to date the contributions collected by this 'Pay by Donation', lunch, fund the Dental issues group which helps the Country Roads Community Health Center provide dental care to those in need.

The UCW not only supports the congregation's activities but also serves as an outreach arm. At a recent pie making event not only did 20+ members of the congregation come out to help make pies but 5 members of the community were enticed to join in the fun. I am told each of these was approached to join the Bell Choir.

The congregation also gets together occasionally for social events such as trips to plays etc., yes, all coordinated by volunteers.

Even the formal church structure, such as presbytery is supported and lead by members of this community.

To the best of my knowledge no one has ever tried to estimate the # of hrs or the value of the volunteer time but it is not difficult to imagine $4-5{,}000$ volunteer hrs over the course of a year. From a small community this is truly a model for the broader church.

And as Rev Takouhi often says "it is not because we do not have alternatives for our time "that Members of PUC decide to participate in the many activities of this vibrant community of faith.

So if you see a member of this community of faith in Eastern Ontario do not be afraid to give them a smile, a hug, a hand shake or a pat on the back as they are bound to be one of the volunteers who are creating this dynamic Community called Portland United Church.

A Stewardship Message

I don't know about you, but this is the time of the year when the mail box seems to be full of requests for money from just about every charity in the country. Guilt mounts as I wrestle with which groups I should support this year and what to do responsibly with all the free gifts that come in envelopes of every size and description. It really has become almost the initial ritual in the lead up to Christmas and the year end. One "need" that I never hear from, but always support is my church. The church seldom asks me for donations, but it supports so many worthwhile ministries that I have no problem reexamining what I give and how I can live my faith more fully this year.

This year is a little different. This year I am the asker on behalf of my church. There is some real concern that we won't reach our budget goal this year. In itself that would not be a huge problem, there are always some reserve funds tucked away for a rainy day. But this year, we are down to our last reserves. If we must dig into those reserves we will not be able to build them up again in time to rescue us from the same fate next year. And that is a slippery slope none of us wants to ride. There are a number of reasons we are in this situation. One of them is the increasing cost of utilities that is affecting every family. Hydro is running about \$480.a month for the church building, that's a \$50 increase from last year. Numbers of people giving are down a bit, and we have not been able to generate the amount of fundraising activities of previous

years – we are all getting a little older and a little less able.

My hope is that as you are doing your own year-end evaluations, you will see the value of the work the church family does, here in Elgin, in the region and in the world and that you will consider the church first when you are making those financial decisions. If charity begins at home, please consider a special gift to your church family in the weeks ahead so that the witness of faith in this community grows stronger and our light shines out into the world.

Several people have asked me to repeat a story about Christmas and the reason for the season I wrote some time ago. So here is a reprint from way back in 2011. Enjoy.

What a statement! What a comment! What a message! How easy it is to become seized with the hype, to focus on the tinsel pleasures, to search for that perfect present. We have to buy the perfect hors d'ouvres, use the perfect place settings, and serve the perfect selection of wines as we host the perfect party for the perfect guests.

Now I'm really not a curmudgeon, I see nothing wrong with celebrating and enjoying good times with neighbours, friends, and relatives. The issue as I see it is the reason for the celebration. Are we using Christmas as the excuse for our own extravagance and overindulgence? Do we justify these actions by telling ourselves, "Didn't the three wise men give baby Jesus expensive gifts? We're just keeping up the tradition. After all, it's in the bible!"

Perhaps, but check the motive. Is your giving focused on the recipient or the giver? Are you concerned with the well-being of others, or a

News from the Trustees of Portland United

The Portland Trustees are happy to share, that as a result of generous donations made this past year to the Memorial account, the Portland United Church Council has decided to move \$4,000 to the Long Term Fund.

In addition, the Trustees have moved that Council once again this year withdraw \$7,000 from the Long Term Fund effective anytime after January 1st, 2017.

\$4,000 of this money is to be used in the Church's General Account and the other \$3,000 is to be used toward Youth initiatives in the North Leeds area.

Anyone wishing to make a donation to the Long Term Fund will receive a Charitable Donation receipt. Beginning in 2017, there will be a specific spot on weekly envelopes to identify Givings to the Long Term Fund.

On behalf of the Trustees, many thanks for giving of your time, finances and energy to the Glory of the newborn King.


