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Thoughts on Advent, from Rev. Kathy Walton



"There will be signs in the sun, the moon, and the stars, and on the earth distress among nations confused by the roaring of the sea and the waves. People will faint from fear and foreboding of what is coming upon the world, for the powers of the heavens will be shaken." Luke 21:25-26.

It is October 25, 2018, and last night Tom and I went to see Anthropocene, a documentary about the impact of humanity on the geology, and the shape and the biosphere of the earth. It was frankly, terrifying. Added to that, the rhetoric and discord in our global political life and indeed "distress among nations" is an accurate description. It was hard to sleep. In my own life, my only aunt has just died and my mother is living the end of her life in a nursing home and I am filled with guilt and remorse and all the feelings of a daughter torn by the needs of the future and the past.

So, when I looked at the readings for the beginning of Advent, I was hoping for the lovely story of Jesus' birth as a distraction, and a calming antidote for the world around me. Alas! Instead I am faced with the very "fears and forebodings" I live with every day. It is a timely reminder to me and I think, to you too, that Jesus did not come into our world, vulnerable, needy, and poor, to be coddled and wrapped in satin and velvet. Nor did he come to a world already peaceful and stable, to simply tell us good stories and reenforce our good will. He came into a struggling world, rife with persecution and oppression, an earth already being changed by the challenges of humans living in a rapidly expanding, hugely complicated world of conquest and negotiation. And his birth, even his birth, just another infant born, so small, so seemingly insignificant, so singular, changed everything.

It took time, it took his life, it is still taking time and it is still taking his life, but his very being still makes a difference. It is a reminder to me, and I think to you, that every age has its signs of the end of time, every age has its oppressors and its tribulations, every age faces loss and choice and fear, but in the face of those things every age has been set back on its heels by the awesome unleashed power displayed by God in the smallest of signs of hope, the tiniest source of light, mustard seeds of faith, whispers and cries of desire for justice.

We struggle, yes, we often despair, yes, but we pick ourselves up and go on, and we go on in hope for a future closer to the kingdom of heaven, because Jesus came into our distressed world to show us that the world could not overcome us – to show us that loving one another is a surer path to peace than hate will ever build. So, it is Advent, and we watch for the signs of the times that tell us not to despair, not to lose hope. Christ came into the world, comes into the world, will always come into our lives and our troubles, making all things new, making our struggles holy, opening our lives so that we become a new creation. It is not ever easy, no birth ever is, but still, inevitably, God comes. "...Raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near." (Luke 21:28)

May God bless you with hope, joy, peace and love this Christmas and always.



BY THE NUMBERS

As Portland United Church approaches the last two months of the year a review of the numbers is in order.

Our congregation continues to face many opportunities, changes and challenges. As we go about trying to influence the community around us many of the opportunities, changes and challenges show up in the numbers. How are we doing? To the end of October 2018, the amount the church has raised for all its activities is up by \$3,500. However, if we look deeper, segments of our activities are being impacted differently.

Dedicated Funds (a reflection of donations directed towards specific projects and missions)

Much of the increase in income this past year was directed to international causes with an increase of \$7,000 to international missions; including Mission and Service, El Salvador, Honduras, and Peace through Education in Lebanon. To date contributions to our local community, missions such as DIG, and the Food bank, are down \$1,500. The designated funds which are directly associated with the church are down slightly. However this is a reflection of need and initiative as the congregation responded to the identified needs with great generosity including raising funds to support the Bell choir's initiative to purchase chimes and the building project to replace our eaves troughs.

Church Operation (General Fund)

Unfortunately the day to day operation of the church continues to run a deficit. To date weekly givings are down close to \$4,000 and funds raised by Fundraising activities are down by roughly \$3,000. Last year's deficit to the end of October was roughly \$10,000 and this year, with the \$7,000 shortfall in revenue, the YTD deficit has grown to \$16,000.

This shortfall has been covered in recent years by the generosity of those before us who had the forethought and resolve to set up our Long Term Fund, which over the last ten years, has earned enough annually to cover our shortfalls. In the world of reduced investment returns that we are experiencing, the Fund was unable to cover last year's deficit without reducing the capital. This year, as our deficit grows and fund earnings are reduced, the capital is being eroded more rapidly.

In addition to facing these immediate influences the greater United Church of Canada is going through major structural changes in the attempt to improve efficiencies and cut costs. With these changes not only will the support systems of presbytery be redistributed or eliminated but the administrative charges individual churches will bear will be increased. This increase is at least in part due to improved transparency as the portion of Mission and Service which was directed to Church administration is redirected to mission work and the church operational needs are born directly by congregational dues. The impact of this for Portland United Church annually is still unclear but estimated at between \$2,000-3,000 annually. Fortunately, this increase will be implemented gradually over a number of years.

Council is currently starting the budgeting process for 2019 and beyond. May your prayers be with us as we search for the path which allows the Community of Portland United Church to continue to influence the world in which we live today, and long into the future.



For the last three years Portland United Church, with the agreement of both Council and the Trustees, has used \$3,000 of our Long Term Fund to support the development of Youth in our community. This year council decided to split the monies between organizations 60% and individuals 40%.

The organizations which have been supported to the end of October this Year are: the Rideau District High School for the band; the Rideau Township Library, to purchase leveled readers; and the South Crosby Public School, to present a cultural event.

We are excited to say our guidelines for supporting individuals are now finalized and our first disbursement has been made.

The guidelines for individual support have been posted on the bulletin board of both churches. Please review them and advance opportunities in which they can be applied as we support the youth of our community in their development toward becoming productive members of society.
